We began caring for our community in our new, state-of-the-art hospital and brought a higher level of care to our area. Unrestricted gifts to the Areas of Greatest Need allow Valley to invest in the programs, services, and improvements that are of the highest priority right now and to do so without delay, allowing Valley to prioritize efficiency, quality, and patient safety.

The Valley Hospital has once again been ranked one of the World's Best Hospitals by *Newsweek*, and one of *Healthgrades'* 100 Best Hospitals for 2025. These awards recognize Valley's clinical performance, as well as its commitment to safety, excellence, and a high-quality patient experience for all.

The Valley Heart and Vascular Institute.

Valley Health System is at the forefront of caring for the heart health of people in our region and beyond, and generous philanthropic gifts have helped to support these efforts. Recognized for its leading-edge commitment to cardiac care, Valley has been honored for its performance in abdominal aortic aneurysm repair, heart attack, heart bypass surgery, heart failure, and transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR) by *U.S. News & World Report*. In 2024:

- Valley treated New Jersey's first patient using the FDA-approved PulseSelect™ Pulsed Field Ablation System to treat atrial fibrillation (AFib), a serious condition affecting millions of Americans. The process delivers precise pulsed electric fields through an ablation catheter, interrupting irregular electrical pathways in the heart that trigger AFib.
- The Valley Hospital is the first in New Jersey to utilize the Naeotom Alpha® CT scanner with Quantum Technology, an imaging technology that provides ultra-clear images to help diagnose conditions more accurately and inform better treatment courses for patients.
- Valley was one of only three institutions in New Jersey offering renal denervation, a minimally invasive, FDA-approved procedure to treat resistant hypertension. The procedure allows Valley to enhance the quality of life for patients struggling with hypertension and reduce associated risks, such as heart attack, stroke, and kidney damage.
- Valley launched a multi-disciplinary Pulmonary Embolism Response Team (PERT) to provide rapid treatment for acute and chronic pulmonary embolism, a condition in which one or more arteries in the lungs become blocked by a blood clot. The team, comprised of interventional cardiologists and vascular surgery experts, works collaboratively to ensure fast, effective care for patients.

Women's Services.

Valley's Women's Services team addresses the entire spectrum of health needs throughout a woman's lifespan, providing comprehensive, compassionate care from adolescence and childbearing years through the challenges of menopause and beyond. The team uses the latest technologies and treatments, and takes a holistic approach to care.

In 2024, a gift of approximately \$220,000 from The Edward W. & Stella C. Van Houten Memorial Fund supported a maternal health program targeting severe maternal morbidity through medically tailored meals and nutrition education for pregnant and postpartum women. The goal of the program is to reduce pregnancy-related complications and enhance birth outcomes by addressing nutritional deficiencies, promoting healthy eating habits, and offering ongoing support from registered dietitians.

Pediatrics.

In 2024, Valley Health System made pediatric primary and subspecialty care more accessible to patients in our region, adding new services in partnership with Mount Sinai's Kravis Children's Hospital. Valley's pediatric offerings include pediatric cardiology, allergy, developmental pediatrics, endocrinology, diabetes care, gastroenterology, nutrition, pulmonology, physiatry, sleep medicine and weight management.

Valley's Pediatrics program has doubled its footprint in The Valley Hospital in Paramus, and increased the number of patients cared for by subspecialty offerings by almost triple in recent years.

Education and collaboration are key, and donor funding allowed for the coordination of a joint symposium with Mount Sinai in 2024 focused on aerodigestive medicine, bringing experts in the field together to address this important topic. The collaboration, which was provided free to residents and medical students, paved the way for the development of an aerodigestive medicine program at Valley to serve the needs of our pediatric patient population and enable better outcomes. Another symposium is planned for May 2025, focusing on perinatal and neonatal medicine and fetal surgery, using artificial intelligence for prenatal diagnosis and predicting outcomes.



NICU.

Valley's Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) doubled in size in The Valley Hospital in Paramus, with 22 private and semi-private rooms. The NICU saw a 10% increase in patient volume in 2024, with 474 NICU admissions, and the team grew to include a fifth neonatologist to support the NICU's continued expansion in Paramus.

The NICU has the latest technologies to care for Valley's tiniest and most vulnerable patients, as well as the resources to ensure that the care provided is both patient-focused and family-centered. The NICU is equipped with an AngelEye camera on each bed, allowing parents to see their infant 24/7, actively participate in their care, and benefit from parent education resources through the platform.

Donor funding allows families in the NICU to be supported by a dedicated Family Support Specialist, who serves as a liaison for NICU families as they navigate their newborn's NICU stay, providing day-to-day support and even coordinating birthday celebrations and holiday festivities. The NICU also hosts annual events such as the Camp NICU fundraiser and the NICU Trunk or Treat, bringing together hundreds of NICU graduates for a reunion.

Generous philanthropic support also allowed for ongoing training for the NICU team's nurses and staff, enabling them to develop their skills to continue to provide the highest level of care to our region's tiniest patients.

Emergency Services and Critical Care.

Valley's Emergency Services team supports our region's emergency needs both in the hospital and in the community. In 2024, Valley's Emergency Department saw 78,273 emergency department visits – 5,000 more than the previous year – including 18,207 pediatric visits.

Valley's emergency services fleet now includes 20 emergency and non-emergency transport vehicles, with plans to add four more in 2025. The paramedic and ambulance teams responded to 18,783 calls for help from the community in 2024, and Valley also expanded its Specialty Care Transport Unit to 24/7 service to support operations at the Ridgewood Campus and the new Recovery and Wellness Unit.

Thanks to philanthropic funds from Valley's Women For Health, the emergency department made enhancements to better support emergency department patients, hiring two part-time mental health advocates and purchasing diversional tools such as sensory soft play toys and baby dolls that can be given to patients with sensory or behavioral health needs. These funds also supported Emergency Nurses Association training focused on behavioral health for all registered nurses in the emergency department, and will be used for alternate furniture and lighting that will enhance the environment for all patients.



Research.

At Valley Health System, we believe that tomorrow's advances in medicine are born from today's research, and Valley is committed to responsible, leading-edge research that improves the lives of our patients. Valley's teams are dedicated to exploring innovative approaches to care, new medical therapies, and breakthroughs in the treatment of many conditions.

Valley's Okonite Research Center, named one of New Jersey's Top Research Centers by NJBIZ in 2024, serves as Valley's home for research and clinical trials. Valley's teams conduct research in many clinical areas, including oncology, cardiology, neurology, gastroenterology, infectious diseases, pulmonology, and rheumatology. Valley ended 2024 with 66 active clinical trials.

For many patients, access to clinical trials offers the greatest potential for a dramatic improvement in their outcomes, and Valley is committed to ensuring that all research initiatives and clinical trials adhere to rigorous regulatory standards. Donor support plays an important role in funding research initiatives and helping to save and change lives.



Ribbon Cutting.

In March 2024, Valley Health System leadership, trustees, and generous members of our donor community were joined by New Jersey Governor Phil Murphy and local elected officials to mark the opening of The Valley Hospital in Paramus with a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

The event honored Valley's long history in Ridgewood and path to Paramus, marking the beginning of a new era in healthcare for our entire region. The ceremony also recognized the contributions of many supporters who helped make the new facility a reality, including some of Valley's leadership donors who supported the *Serve. Care. Transform.* campaign.

"This will become not just one of the premier hospitals in the state or the Northeast, but in the United States of America," Governor Murphy said during the celebration.

Built with patient safety, privacy, and comfort in mind, the new hospital brought together cutting-edge technology and the world-class care for which Valley has always been known.

"Today marks the culmination of a vision Valley has long had to offer our community the most technologically advanced, beautifully designed and constructed, sustainable, patient-friendly facility," said Audrey Meyers, CEO Emeritus of Valley Health System. "Today, Valley ensures its future as the healthcare system of choice for our region. It is a great privilege to cut this ribbon, knowing that all those who come through our doors for their care will be well served by Valley's compassionate staff and this stunning facility for generations to come."

Move Day.

On April 14th, The Valley Hospital opened its doors in Paramus and began providing care in our new home. The opening was the culmination of more than a decade of collaboration between our medical teams, Valley leadership, and our community.

Moving an entire hospital is a once-in-a-lifetime experience, and the transition from Ridgewood

to Paramus was made possible thanks to the help and coordination of so many. On Move Day, more than 400 volunteers, Valley leadership, and staff arrived before sunrise and safely moved some 200 patients from Ridgewood to Paramus in less than eight hours.

Teams prepared for this move with months of training, conducting mock move trials to prepare for a seamless transition between campuses, as well as day-in-the-life training to help staff establish workflows and acclimate to providing care in the new facility.

Shortly after the doors of The Valley Hospital in Paramus opened, the hospital began celebrating its many "firsts"—the hospital's first patient, first surgery, and just a couple hours in, the first baby born in Valley's new chapter.

"The Valley Hospital is now at the heart of a 40-acre health and wellness campus that offers our patients the opportunity to receive virtually every healthcare service they may need in one location, including In-patient care, outpatient procedures, cancer care, the ability to see many of Valley's doctors, and more," said Robert Brenner, MD, MMM, FACHE, President & CEO of Valley Health System.

Audrey Meyers Family Care Pavilion.

The Valley Hospital Foundation dedicated the Audrey Meyers Family Care Pavilion in honor of the 45-year career of Audrey Meyers, CEO Emeritus, and her many contributions to Valley's past, present, and future.

The Family Care Pavilion houses Valley's Labor and Delivery, Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), Postpartum, and Pediatrics units at The Valley Hospital, caring for thousands of women and children each year. The dedication of Valley's premier pavilion, made possible thanks to a generous donation from an anonymous donor in Audrey's honor, was celebrated on December 18th in the lobby of the hospital.

During the ceremony, Audrey also announced her retirement at the end of January 2025. A portrait of Audrey painted by portrait artist Paul Jannis and gifted to Valley by the members of the Valley Health System Board of Trustees was shared for the first time.

One of the longest-serving hospital CEOs in New Jersey, Audrey has held nearly every key executive leadership position in strategic planning, management, operations, and governance, and served as both the President and CEO of The Valley Hospital and Valley Health System for two decades.

A NEW ERA FOR VALLEY.

Advanced technologies and efficiencies that improve care, enhance safety and optimize the patient and family experience are core components of The Valley Hospital in Paramus.

The state-of-the-art facility includes spacious patient rooms, an expanded emergency department, larger operating and procedure rooms, and much more.

Valley's operating rooms are equipped with leading-edge medical technologies, including a sterile air curtain filtration system that surrounds the surgical area to prevent contamination and an intraoperative MRI suite, which allows surgical teams to access MRI imaging in real-time during surgery to guide their next steps.

Patient rooms are equipped with footwalls featuring 75-inch televisions, technology that detects and displays clinical team members as they enter the room, and iPad technology that allows patients to control their own environment. Nurse servers allow team members to restock supplies

from the hallway to minimize patient interruptions.

Valley believes that the support of families and caregivers is imperative to the healing process, and the new facility is designed with space to accommodate a higher level of patient family engagement than ever before.

The Valley Hospital in Paramus is committed to sustainability, with more than 30 percent of the hospital setting dedicated to green space. The hospital features sprawling lawns and two green roofs, and employs best practices for energy efficiency, space utilization, and water consumption.

Flexibility is an important part of the new hospital's design, and the new facility was built with the capability to adapt to future healthcare changes, prepared to meet the community's healthcare needs today, tomorrow, and long into the future.

Women for Health.

Valley's *Women For Health* has awarded more than \$1.6 million to a wide array of Valley programs and services since its inception in 2011. This dedicated group of female philanthropists pool their resources and select a worthy Valley program or service as the recipient of their collective gift each year.

In 2024, the group of approximately 130 women voted to grant \$130,000 to support efforts to increase cultural competencies around LGBTQ+ care for providers through Valley Medical Group (VMG). These educational efforts will increase awareness and preparedness among providers and staff to better serve patients in the LGBTQ+ community, standardize care practices, and foster a culture of continuous learning and improvement among VMG staff.

Generous funding from the 2023 grant supported clinical enhancements to the emergency department and staff training to support patients who seek emergency care during a mental health crisis or those who have sensory needs. *Read more on page 5.*

Graduate Medical Education.

Valley introduced its Graduate Medical Education (GME) program in 2024, welcoming its first class of residents in internal medicine and OB-GYN in July. The new program, accredited by the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) and hosted in partnership with Mount Sinai's Icahn School of Medicine, trains the next generation of Valley physicians.

Valley's first class included 15 residents, with plans to welcome a second class and introduce a General Surgery residency program in 2025, along with more specialties in the future.

A recent anonymous gift to the GME program funded the addition of behavioral health education into the GME programs to support the internal medicine residency behavioral health training, including curriculum development, clinical rotations in integrated behavioral health clinics, trainee wellness and wellbeing initiatives to support resiliency, and more.

In addition, a generous \$100,000 gift from the Valley Hospital Medical Staff supported the overall development and enhancements to the GME program and the next generation of Valley physicians.

Valley's resident physicians care for patients throughout The Valley Hospital, as well as in the Ridgewood campus' Earl A. Wheaton, Jr, M.D. Family Care Center, gaining critical experience and making an impact across our organization.



Clinical Education.

Valley Health System has always been known for its high level of expert, compassionate care, and prioritizes ongoing education and training to ensure staff and clinical teams are prepared to deliver the best care for our patients.

Valley started 2024 training almost 3,500 staff members to provide a seamless and safe transition from Ridgewood to The Valley Hospital in Paramus. The training included simulation exercises to ensure safe workflows, skills reinforcement, and training on new equipment.

Donor funding was instrumental in the purchase of multiple training simulation manikins to support skills training exercises, including one that simulates birth and simulation arms to practice IV sticks.

In 2024, more than 4,717 participants were trained in more than 750 training sessions across Valley Health System. As Valley continues to evolve, training will remain at the forefront to ensure that clinical teams are equipped and prepared with the latest technologies and techniques.

Donor support also allowed Valley to implement training for 731 frontline employees in de-escalation techniques to prevent workplace violence, which healthcare workers are five times more likely than other professionals to experience. Philanthropic support has also allowed medical teams to attend national conferences and participate in training to advance their competencies and knowledge.

Oncology.

Valley-Mount Sinai Comprehensive Cancer Care serves patients with all types of cancer through diagnosis, treatment, and survivorship, offering leading-edge cancer treatment and personalized care tailored to each patient.

In 2024, donor support funded several survivorship events focusing on topics including empowerment, body image, sexual health, and more, bringing patients together and addressing the impact that a cancer diagnosis has on both physical and mental health. These events address an unmet need in survivorship support and build community among patients.

Valley's annual Step Up for Valley virtual fitness challenge dedicated \$63,000 to support programs and services at the Cancer Center. Generous donor support also benefited Valley's financial toxicity program, providing gift cards for food, gas, and other essentials for patients who meet strict criteria for financial need due to the high cost of cancer treatment.

Valley embarked on new advanced therapies in 2024 to treat patients with various blood cancers. The Cancer Center began using bispecific antibody therapy, in which antibodies bind to two different proteins in the body to activate a patient's immune system to help destroy the cancer cells in the body. Valley's clinical teams are collaborating with leaders at the Mount Sinai Tisch Cancer Center and the Icahn School of Medicine to introduce CAR-T therapy at Valley. In this innovative treatment, the body's immune cells are modified and equipped with receptors that allow them to recognize and attack cancer. This novel approach has been found to be effective in patients with multiple myeloma, lymphoma, and other malignant diseases who no longer respond to other treatments, and may be of benefit in the treatment of rheumatologic diseases, such as lupus.

Looking ahead, Valley-Mount Sinai Cancer Care is committed to bringing more groundbreaking treatments to patients with cancer to treat the disease as early and effectively as possible and enable the best possible outcomes for the patients.



Auxiliary.

The Valley Hospital Auxiliary has served Valley for 81 years, partnering with The Valley Hospital Foundation to make a difference in the communities we serve. Fundraising and volunteering their time throughout the hospital, Valley's more than 550 Auxilians in 13 branches have contributed more than \$21 million over the years.

In 2024, the Auxiliary neared the fulfillment of its latest pledge – the largest in the Auxiliary's history – of \$3 million to support the establishment of the pediatric section of the Emergency Department at The Valley Hospital and \$100,000 to support *Butterflies*, Valley's pediatric palliative and hospice care program. With \$2.9 million raised so far, Auxilians expect to fulfill their commitment in 2025.

Auxilians host much-anticipated fundraising events each year, including the annual Golf Outing, the annual Sporting Clays Classic at the Hudson Farm Club, the annual Terri Roemer Paramus Run, and the annual Tree of Light Illumination Ceremony. The 76th annual Valley Ball, a time-honored Valley tradition, was celebrated at The Lighthouse at Chelsea Piers in the fall of 2024, honoring Valley Health System CEO Emeritus Audrey Meyers for her decades of service to Valley.

In addition, the Auxiliary supports students in our local communities, awarding \$25,000 in college scholarships to high school seniors and college students each year.

Geriatrics.

The United States' elderly population is rapidly growing, and specialty-trained providers in geriatric care are in higher demand than ever before. However, a national shortage of providers trained in this important field is leaving a critical gap in care for this vulnerable patient population.

At Valley, caring for patients' unique needs in all stages of life is a top priority. A generous gift from an anonymous donor in 2024 will help expand Valley's Geriatrics program, funding an endowment in honor of Bennett Leifer, M.D., that will support education in evidence-based practices, training in special topics in geriatrics, research opportunities, and attendance at professional conferences for continued fostering of expertise. In addition, the gift supports the mentorship of physicians in geriatric practice, as well as staff development to increase access to the safe, effective, personalized care that older adults in our region need and deserve.

Valley Home Care.

Valley Home Care (VHC) serves the needs of more than 12,000 people in Bergen and Passaic Counties and, in 2024, provided 278,386 patient visits. Its services include skilled nursing, specialty clinicians in infusion therapy, wound care, ostomy, cardiac care, diabetes care, maternal and child health, rehabilitation, and more.

This year, VHC expanded its wound and ostomy program, with two full-time wound clinicians who not only make house visits but also view HIPAA-compliant photos remotely and recommend treatment to the home care providers in the field. This allows for quicker visualization of a patient's wounds, faster treatment, and reduced emergency visits and rehospitalization.

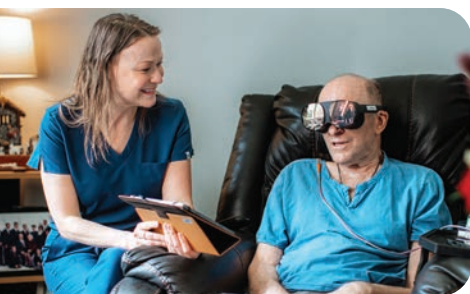
VHC's maternal child health program provided 3,639 visits in 2024, lending support to new mothers and infants and treating conditions such as jaundice, which often appears in the days after discharge, allowing mothers and babies to stay home together and bond, rather than returning to the hospital.

Donor funding made an impact on VHC's *Butterflies* pediatric palliative care and hospice program. Thanks to generous donor support, family members of *Butterflies* patients were able to come together to honor their loved ones at the second annual Butterfly Release ceremony. The event serves as both a memorial and a therapeutic gathering for families who are able to meet and engage with other families who have lived the same experience.

Donor support helps to continue to serve our Valley Home Care and *Butterflies* patients and offers resources that are often not covered by insurance but are transformative for the patients and families served.

Hospice.

Valley Hospice provides compassionate, end-of-life care to patients and support for their families in their final days, focusing on fulfilling their wishes and helping them live out their lives in the way that is most meaningful to them.

Generous donor support was provided for Valley Hospice's Virtual Voyage program, which in 2024 sent more than 20 patients and their loved ones on virtual experiences to the places that matter most to them. One patient dreamed of traveling to Italy with friends and family. The whole family cooked Italian dishes, made fake passports and airline tickets, and prepared for the virtual trip of a lifetime using virtual reality goggles. Another patient – a former Ironman and Triathlon competitor – traveled to San Francisco, where he was able to see the course of his most recent race and even view the restaurant where he enjoyed a celebratory post-race meal with friends.

Donor support also allows for music and art therapy for patients, including personalized experiences, such as a patient who verbally guided his art therapist through a painting of his beloved pets, sharing a meaningful bond, and completing a beautiful painting together.

Honoring patients' unique experiences and backgrounds, Valley Hospice also honors patients who are former nurses with a dedicated Nightingale Salute in their last days, and has specialized We Honor Veterans training for all staff to meet the end-of-life needs of veterans and their families in their final days.
