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Letter From the Chief Development Officer

It is incredible to think that it has been one year since we announced our Serve. Care. Transform. campaign for The Valley Hospital in Paramus. Even more impressive is seeing the progress being made both on-site and behind the scenes, as well as watching your philanthropic support approach our \$125 million goal. It has been an exciting journey in what continues to be an extraordinary time. Through it all, we have been constantly reminded how dedicated our Valley community is to our success and to making our new hospital a reality!

Our campaign has been about both emphasizing Valley's unique standards for enhancing the patient and family experience and about transformation. You can see this firsthand as our campus in Paramus nears completion, on track for a late 2023 opening. Your response to this project has been enthusiastic and generous, helping us raise, at the time of this writing, over \$103 million. Much of this was accomplished with limited personal interactions due to COVID-19. Late this spring, with safety precautions in place, we resumed some of our events, including our Leadership Reception in June. After three years apart, I was thrilled to have the opportunity to say thank you in person, not to faces on a screen. That evening we recognized our newest Lifetime Benefactors who had reached milestones in their philanthropic contributions to Valley. In addition, we announced an expanded recognition program to include a new Lifetime Benefactor category, Nickel, for cumulative lifetime giving of \$250,000 to \$499,999. In our winter issue earlier this year, you met grateful patient Jeff Seidler and his family. After a life-threatening heart attack in March 2021, Jeff focused on giving back as part of his recovery and healing process. After making a generous gift to Valley in support of the hospital's critical care units, cardiac research, and cardiac rehabilitation, Jeff came up with the idea of a virtual fundraiser, Step Up For Valley. The week-long fitness challenge took place from July 17 to July 23, with 134 participants counting steps and completing over 1,400 miles and raising more than \$103,000 for our new hospital. "Music helps us connect parts of us even when language can't," explains Jennifer Knittel, board-certified music therapist for Valley Hospice. "In hospice care, even when it appears someone is having a passive response, music is still actively working its way through their body systems." Music therapy is an established health profession in which music is used within a therapeutic relationship to address physical, emotional, cognitive, and social needs of individuals. Launched at Valley in 2018 with a philanthropic gift from David's Fund, Music Therapy is a beloved and integral program to those navigating end-of-life care.

"I was lucky; it was caught early, and I had a fabulous team of doctors," Sara says. "I completed everything at the end of 2019 and set about planning for a party in 2020. And then COVID-19 happened."

More than two years later, in the spring of 2022, Sara and her family were finally able to host a celebratory "Pink Out," where guests were encouraged to wear pink in honor of Sara's fight against breast cancer. On the event's invitation, Sara had decided to include a link to The Valley Hospital Foundation's website, asking people to consider making a donation to Valley's Breast Center in honor of the care she had received. "All throughout my treatment, people asked questions and wanted to know about my doctors and what was going on. The care I was getting wasn't just top of mind for me, but for other people as well. It was amazing." Sara is thrilled at the response the link received, and grateful for her community's personal and philanthropic support. "This didn't start as a fundraiser; it really was so organic," Sara says. "I wanted to do something that would give back to Valley, and I'm delighted that, together with my friends and family, we could have an even bigger impact."

Valley and Mount Sinai Expand Partnership to Provide **Specialty Children's Services in Northern New Jersey**

Valley Health System has announced a clinical collaboration with Mount Sinai Health System to offer an expanded roster of children's services in northern New Jersey. This partnership will offer local access to specialty pediatric providers affiliated with Mount Sinai Kravis Children's Hospital and support the development of new pediatric health programs and services at Valley.

"We are very pleased to welcome our colleagues from Mount Sinai to our team of well-established pediatric subspecialists," said J. Antonio Quiros, M.D., DHA, Chair of Children's Services for Valley Medical Group

and Clinical Professor of Pediatrics and faculty at Mount Sinai Kravis Children's Hospital and the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. "Through this relationship, we will be able to expand our range of services and provide our pediatric patients the benefit of world-class expertise close to home, here in Bergen County."

The children's health alliance is the second of such collaborations between the two organizations. After announcing plans in December 2015 to join forces on clinical programs, research, and educational offerings, Valley-Mount Sinai Comprehensive Cancer Care



was established in 2016 to provide enhanced inpatient and outpatient cancer services. The alliance offers to an expanded roster of clinical trials and Mount Sinai's nationally renowned experts in the field of cancer care, and promotes the development of new programs and services.

Since then, Valley has welcomed Mount Sinai specialists in the areas of cardiology, endocrinology, allergy/immunology, and gastroenterology to its team of pediatric specialty care providers. Mount Sinai specialists will join a team of Valley pediatric specialists in an array of clinical areas,

including developmental pediatrics, physiatry, psychiatry, pulmonology, and weight management. Additional clinical areas will be added in the coming months.

The Valley Hospital Emergency Department was selected as a recipient of the prestigious Lantern Award from the Emergency Nurses Association. Valley is one of only 29 hospitals nationwide, and the only hospital in Bergen County to earn this award for 2022. The award showcases Valley's accomplishments in incorporating evidence-based practice into emergency care and is a symbol of our commitment to quality, safety, and a healthy work environment.



Valley Health System is ranked as the top healthcare employer in New Jersey in the Forbes 2022 list of best-in-state employers. Valley ranked first in the Healthcare & Social Industry category and among the top 15 best employers in New Jersey overall.



The Valley Hospital was awarded the Greenhealth Emerald Award from Practice Greenhealth in recognition of our sustainability practices. This award recognizes healthcare organizations for their dedication to making sustainability part of the fabric of their operations and culture. Practice Greenhealth also awarded Valley its Greening the OR Recognition Award for our efforts in improving environmental performance in the operating room.



Anne Brennecke, APN, Manager of Valley's Wound, Ostomy & Continence Center, was selected as a New Jersey Fifth District Hometown Hero by U.S. Congressman Josh Gottheimer. Anne was recognized for her incredible 50 years of service to Valley and for her role in establishing the Wound, Ostomy & Continence Center — the only nurse-run outpatient facility of its kind in northern New Jersey.



Jersey's Best magazine named 25 physicians from The Valley Hospital medical staff to its July 2022 list of Top Cancer Doctors. The 25 Valley Medical Staff members come from multiple specialties, including colon and rectal cancer, gynecologic cancer, gastrointestinal cancer, pancreatic cancer, lung cancer, breast cancer, prostate cancer, esophageal cancer, solid tumors, brain tumors, breast reconstruction, body imaging, and more.



In the fifth edition of "Humanizing Brand Experience," a national research report conducted by brand consultant Monigle, the American Hospital Association, and the Society for Health Care Strategy & Market Development, Valley Health System was named a top health system brand, ranking eighth on the list of the top 201 healthcare brands in the country. In addition, Valley ranked second on a list of top 10 brands that have the best people and fourth on a list of top 10 brands that are most committed to improving diversity and inclusion.



The Valley Hospital has been ranked among the top three hospitals by NJBIZ, based on inpatient activity. Valley posted nearly 34,000 discharges in 2021, moving up two spots from last year's list.



Eleonora Teplinsky, M.D. Head of Breast Medical Oncology at Valley-Mount Sinai Comprehensive Cancer Care, was chosen as a 2022 NJBIZ Healthcare Hero in the Healthcare Professional category. Since joining Valley in 2017, Dr. Teplinsky has served as the Principal Investigator for clinical trials that advance treatment for breast cancer, presented at national conferences, has been published in peer-reviewed journals, and serves as a member of the Gynecologic Cancer Advisory Panel for Cancer.Net.



U.S. News & World Report ranked The Valley Hospital among the best hospitals in New Jersey, placing Valley third on the list of 98 New Jersey hospitals evaluated for their 2022-2023 list of best hospitals. Valley also achieved an overall ranking as the 16th best hospital in a two-way tie in the entire New York metropolitan area. In addition, Valley also achieved the highest possible rating — high performing — in 13 areas of care.



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
