For a second consecutive year, Valley Health System has been designated as a "2019 LGBTQ Healthcare Equality Leader" by the Human Rights Campaign Foundation, the educational arm of the nation's largest lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) civil rights organization.



The Valley Hospital has been named one of America's 250
Best Hospitals by Healthgrades, placing us among the top five percent of hospitals nationwide for superior clinical performance. Valley is one of only four hospitals in New Jersey to earn this distinction for 2020.



Valley has been recognized as one of America's 100
Best Hospitals for Stroke Care, General Surgery, and Gastrointestinal



Valley's Cancer Program has earned a Three-Year Accreditation by the Commission on Cancer of the American College of Surgeons. Accreditation is only awarded to facilities that voluntarily commit to providing the highest quality of cancer care through a patient-centered, multidisciplinary approach.



Valley is a four-time recipient of the prestigious Magnet Designation for Nursing Excellence from the American Nurses Credentialing Center.



The Valley Hospital holds disease-specific certifications from The Joint Commission in six clinical areas, including chronic obstructive pulmonary disease; perinatal care; stroke; total hip replacement; total knee replacement; and wound care.

GIFTS MAKE AN IMPACT



Last year, philanthropy had a significant impact on patient care and research at Valley-Mount Sinai Comprehensive Cancer Care. Ridgewood resident Benjamin Sims included Valley in his estate plans in memory of his sister, Carol. In 2019, Valley's oncology program received a donation from this planned gift, through which the Sims legacy lives on.

Valley and Mount Sinai oncologists continue their collaborative effort to provide state-of-the-art, comprehensive cancer care to an increasing number of patients in northern New Jersey. In August of 2019, Valley welcomed Michael J. Passeri, MS, MD, (pictured below) to the Valley Institute for Gastrointestinal Cancer. Dr. Passeri, a talented board-certified surgeon, specializes in minimally



invasive surgery for benign and malignant diseases of the liver, pancreas, and bile ducts. Mount Sinai surgical oncologists join Dr. Passeri in the operating room to participate in complex procedures and bring special expertise to Valley's weekly video care conferences, assuring optimal treatment for our patients.

Philanthropy helps support the expanding *Valley-Mount Sinai Head and Neck Institute*, a unique program providing novel therapies, clinical trials, and personalized care for more patients with cancers of the mouth, throat, head, and neck.

One of the more noteworthy accomplishments of last year was that Valley-Mount Sinai Comprehensive Cancer Care achieved certification from the Quality Oncology Practice Initiative (QOPI), the quality program of the American Society of Clinical Oncology. Just over 300 programs internationally have attained QOPI certification. The generosity of our donors supports Valley's ongoing commitment to excellence in cancer care, research, and innovation.

The Valley Heart and Vascular Institute continues to meet and exceed patient expectations while setting standards for excellence and innovation that rival the best cardiovascular departments anywhere. With an emphasis on research, more than 300 patients took part in over 50 cardiovascular clinical trials at The Valley Hospital.

Last year, Valley's Cardiovascular Imaging Program was enhanced with the addition of Coronary Computed Tomography (CT) derived 3T MRI, which allow for more precise and more rapid cardiac MRI scans. This new technology enables physicians to accurately differentiate patients in need of an invasive intervention from those who can be managed with medications alone.

Also in 2019, Valley was able to offer patients with central sleep apnea — which is linked to high blood pressure, abnormal heart rhythm, and heart attack — a new solution: The remedē® System. During a minimally invasive outpatient procedure, this pacemaker-like device is placed under the skin in the upper chest area. Valley is *one of only two sites* in New Jersey using The remedē® System.

Within Valley's 3D Print Lab, clinicians can now create accurate and cost-effective anatomical models. Having access to this technology is revolutionizing pre-procedure strategy and is leading to improved communication between clinician and patient.

In November 2019, Valley welcomed an international faculty and hosted the inaugural REsuscitation and Acute CatheTer (REACT) Lab Emergencies Course in North America. A multidisciplinary team from the Cardiac Cath/Electrophysiology and Same Day Recovery areas participated. Course participants reviewed practical guidelines, human factors training, and a streamlined multi-disciplinary team approach to addressing emergencies in the interventional and recovery arenas.



In 2019, Valley staff provided the highest level of care for 342 acutely ill newborns admitted to Valley's Level 3 Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). The generous amount of philanthropic support provided to Valley's NICU program is allowing staff to conduct two important clinical research trials focused on quality, family-centered care.

Because of the sensitive clinical circumstances preventing parents from having more physical contact with their NICU baby, it can be difficult for them to form an emotional bond with their infant. Parents often report feeling deprived of holding the baby directly after birth, lying skin-to-skin for extended periods of time, and looking into their baby's eyes.

I feel like I wouldn't have known what to do without the Family Nurture Intervention program. You helped me connect with my baby, and you were always there for me.

With that in mind, the first trial incorporated Family Nurture Intervention and was specifically designed to establish better neurodevelopmental trajectories for premature infants and to decrease anxiety and depression for their mothers. The second study follows how the NICU staff is affected by outcomes of the first study. While results are still pending, the interventional studies have already made a significant impact on Valley's approach to patient care, family interactions, and NICU staff self-care.

The 5th Annual NICU Fashion Show & Tricky Tray was held at the Venetian on May 21, 2019. Valley's NICU families and staff collaborate each year to make this well attended event a fundraising success.




Philanthropy helped Valley Home Care meet the increasing demand for a full spectrum of treatments by offering vital new programs and the latest in medical technology.

For instance, Valley delved further into the world of telemedicine — monitoring a patient without requiring them to leave their home — which helped reduce the need for re-hospitalization, enhance patient's adherence to treatment plans, and increase patient confidence. In 2019, Valley Home Care conducted 865 tele-management visits to create a comprehensive care continuum between the patient, physical therapist, referring physician, and telehealth nursing team.

Health Recovery Solutions virtually brings the health care provider right into the patients' homes every day, providing them with the comfort of knowing they are being 'looked at' daily via the monitor readings and survey questions, even when they are not face-to-face. >>

Through Valley Hospice's pediatric art therapy program, Journeys, 445 children and adolescents ages 3 to 17 were provided bereavement counseling and support services last year. Valley's board-certified art and music therapists provided children affected by serious illness or death of a loved one with a safe place to express their grief, anger, and fear, while developing important coping skills. The art therapist helped patients and siblings express their feelings and reactions to the illness through the creation of art pieces through various art modalities. Valley Home Care also offered music therapy to address patients' and caregivers' physical, emotional, cognitive, and social needs through sound intervention.



Utilizing telehealth technology, Valley's staff is able to monitor high-risk patients remotely, send medication reminders, provide educational materials, and communicate with them in real-time through video, phone and text chat.

All Single Patient Rooms

A key feature of the new hospital design is single patient rooms. Each room will enhance patient privacy, foster a quieter environment, and provide ample space for families to participate in the healing process. Evidence has also shown that single patient rooms in hospitals help prevent and control healthcare-associated infections. The flexible design will also enable us to convert a patient's room- or an entire unit- from standard to isolation type with the touch of a button, enabling us to rapidly respond to situations like those faced during the coronavirus pandemic.



Integrated Care

In many medical emergencies, time is of the essence. When a patient is suspected of having a stroke, a rapid triage, exam, and diagnosis must be made in order to administer life-saving medication and treatment in a defined timespan in order for it to be effective. At the new Paramus campus, there will be a central interventional platform which will physically integrate service between The Emergency Department, Diagnostic Imaging and Testing, Operating, and Procedural Rooms. Within this new concept, Valley is able to build its first Stroke Center to rapidly assess and treat patients showing signs of a stroke. This integration and co-location of functions will increase efficiencies and reduce patient transit through the hospital.



Environmentally Sustainable

The creation of the new hospital provides a unique opportunity to reaffirm Valley's commitment to the health of our community through progressive, eco-friendly design. The planning, constructing, operating, and maintenance of the hospital will have built-in sustainable elements. Valley believes that minimizing its environmental impact and maintaining a healthy atmosphere are vital components of its delivery of care to our region.



Globally-Ranked Healthcare Close to Home

Valley's team of physicians, nurses, and medical professionals have earned global rankings and prestigious awards for patient care and safety. This is the team that is informing the design of our new facility — right here in our community. The Valley Hospital in Paramus is adjacent to Valley's Luckow Pavilion where our oncology services and same-day surgery areas are housed to provide convenient access to comprehensive care. The campus is located close to the area's major highways and is easily accessible to patients coming from all directions. Those in need of medical attention don't need to cross the Hudson River to get access to world-class care — it is right here. The value of the proximity of resources has taken on new significance in light of the coronavirus pandemic.



Behind the Scenes: Stepping Inside the Test Room

To ensure that the planned design elements meet the needs of our frontline caregivers and those who support them, mock-up rooms have been created in our 140 East Ridgewood Avenue building adjacent to the construction site. There, Medical/Surgical, Emergency Department, Labor and Delivery, and Critical Care exam and patient rooms along with an operating room will be walked through by expert clinicians and nurses. They will test the experience of the designs, confirm the best placement of furniture, equipment, and utility connections, and ensure the highest level of patient and family-centered care.
