The center combines the skills of specialists in pulmonary hypertension, pulmonary critical care, advanced heart failure, heart failure surgery, and hypertrophic cardiomyopathy.

Heart failure and cardiomyopathy are closely connected, but they don't always occur

simultaneously. Valley's Heart and Vascular Institute recognizes the differences and the overlap between the conditions and brings together the important skills needed to treat both conditions.

"At The Knispel Center for Comprehensive Cardiomyopathy Care, our multidisciplinary team of subspecialists works together to treat cardiomyopathies and heart failure. The experience of our team allows us to diagnose and manage the full spectrum of these cardiac conditions to restore functional quality of life," said Suneet Mittal, MD, Chair, Cardiovascular Service Line, Valley Health System. 

Presented by Lori Nuzzi, DC, Valley's Director of Integrative Medicine, the technology repurposes advanced VR gaming technology for healthcare, creating a therapeutic experience for people in pain. The approach features a series of home-based treatment protocols that blend cognitive therapy, mindfulness, pain neuroscience, and more to help retrain how patients' brains respond to pain.

Membership in Valley's *Women For Health* is open to all women. Members contribute an annual gift of \$1,000 and consider a variety of worthwhile Valley programs and services to collectively support.


To date, *Women For Health* has provided more than \$1.6 million in funding.

## Valley Launches Hospital at Home Program

Valley's newly launched *Hospital at Home* program brings the same high-quality, hospital-level care you would receive as an inpatient at The Valley Hospital right to the comfort of your own home.

The program provides eligible patients with daily clinical assessments, 24/7 monitoring, medical supplies, and home visits from nurses and specialists so they can more quickly and successfully heal in the comfort of their own home. With daily virtual clinician visits, in-home nursing visits, remote monitoring, and clinical support, patients receive the same high standard of care that they would receive in the hospital.

Participation in the program requires a referral from the physician overseeing a patient's care at The Valley Hospital, followed by an assessment of the patient's clinical stability, available support and safety at home, and insurance coverage to ensure the care is appropriate for the patient.



The program allows for faster recovery, thanks to the comfort and familiarity of a home environment; increased mobility; less time spent in a hospital bed; and reduced risk of hospital readmission.
